It gives me immense pride to present this year's Annual Report of Society for wildlife conservation, education and research (Wild-CER), reflecting our commitment to protecting India's rich biodiversity through science, compassion, and collaboration.

President's Note

This year, our work in the field of vulture conservation has taken encouraging strides in Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh. Vultures, nature's indispensable clean-up crew, face unprecedented threats from poisoning, habitat loss, and declining food availability. Through targeted monitoring, awareness campaigns, and strategic partnerships with local communities and veterinary stakeholders, we have advanced mission to safeguard these critical our scavengers and restore balance to fragile ecosystems. We could complete the vulture census in association with Maharashtra Forest Department successfully building the capacity of the frontline staff to conduct such activities on their own.

Beyond vultures, wildlife conservation at large remained at the heart of our activities. Our team worked across several landscapes from Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh and Bihar to protect threatened species and habitats, integrating field-based research with strong community engagement. These efforts underscore our belief that conservation is most effective when it is locally rooted and scientifically informed.

An important aspect of our work this year has been disease investigation and surveillance in and around protected area—understanding and addressing health threats at the interface of wildlife, livestock, and human populations.

Our surveillance and field diagnostics not only help detect emerging diseases but also guide practical interventions that protect both biodiversity and livelihoods.

All these initiatives are anchored in the One Health approach—recognizing that the health of people, animals, and ecosystems is deeply interconnected. By fostering collaborations between conservation biologists, veterinarians, public health experts, and local stakeholders, we aim to build resilient ecosystems where wildlife and human communities can thrive together. Our work at Tadoba Andhari Tiger Reserve reflects our commitment in the field of one health where we could complete around 300 dog neutering operations and around 1000 antirabies vaccination in dogs around the forest area around Nagpur, Maharashtra.

As we reflect on the past year's challenges and successes, I extend heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated team, partners, donors, and community members whose support fuels our mission. Together, we reaffirm our commitment to a future where conservation is guided by evidence, driven by compassion, and sustained by collective action.




About Wild-CER




